Background: Many different types of hide-and-seek games were played in Australia and the Torres Strait Islands. A game played in one part of Victoria in the latter part of the 1800s was called braierack (the wild man). It was essentially a game of hide and seek whereby a player would hide in a wombat hole and would need to be dua out of this hiding place.

Short description: A simple game of hide and seek, suitable for younger children.



Players: Groups of four or more players Playing area: A designated area suitable to the activity

#### Game play and basic rules

- The brajerack hides in the playing area and the other players attempt to find him or her.
- Change around after the brajerack has been caught.

#### Variations

- Have a number of brajeracks. After three are caught a new game begins.
- Play at night using torches.
- The brajerack hides somewhere in a hall or designated area and the finders only have 60 seconds to find him or her.
